At Ghundu's Djinang-Djaa our aim is to support Indigenous children and their families, connecting them to support services, to best prepare them for school.

We offer services such as:

- Transportation to and from education and/or health appointments.
- Referrals to service specific for your family.
- Connection to Country and cultural experiences on K'gari and mainland.
- A centralized, family friendly drop-in service.
- Enrolment and paperwork assistance for Daycare, Kindy and Prep.
- Advocacy and meditation during tough times.
- Navigating culturally diverse services.

Our office is located in the lovely town of Maryborough Queensland and our operational scope extends all over the Fraser Coast Region. The country on which we meet, and work is Butchulla Country.

MCDATSIC is moving to a new office on


Kent Street and we can't wait for you to pop


Duration: 90 minute sessions each via TEAMS.

The 2024 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children's Day theme Strong in Culture, Stronger Together elevates the intention of Children's Day, focusing on the strength of our children that comes from their connection to culture and mob.

This year we stand with our children, proud of their culture, stories, kin and community – all that makes our children special, resilient and the bright leaders of our future. We hope that this year's Children's Day theme empowers our children, making them feel proud of who they are and where they come from. Showing them that their culture is one of the most sacred, strong and important assets that they can have.

If our children are strong in culture, then they are strong in their identity, and this is important for future generations to come.

Children's Day 2024 falls on a Sunday. We are encouraging services and centres to hold their Children's Day events on Friday, 2 August. 4 August will still be marked and recognised as the date for Children's Day, however, we encourage celebrations to happen on a weekday to be inclusive of children, early years services and schools.

# OG public guardian

The Office of the Public Guardian has staff called Community Visitors. Community Visitors visit young people in out of home care – including foster care placements and residential homes, watchhouses and youth detention centres. The Community Visiting and Advocacy program provides much needed support to young people in care, offering the young people an opportunity to yarn with us and raise any concerns or worries that they may have. When concerns or worries are identified, Community Visitors advocate to the young person's Child Safety Officer in line with the young person's views and wishes.

Community Visitors can help with a wide range of matters such as family contact, schooling, therapeutic support, cultural needs and health and safety. We are in the unique position of being an independent statutory government agency (we are not the Child Safety department) able to exclusively advocate on behalf of young people's views and wishes. About the only thing we cannot help with is a decision to bring young people into foster care.

Community Visiting and Advocacy can be contacted on 1300 653 187 about any concerns or worries for young people in out of home care. When requested by a young person or concerned community member, we will visit the young person to check in and then follow up on any concerns



For Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, Australia's colonial history is characterised by devastating land dispossession, violence, and racism. Over the last half-century, however, many significant steps towards reconciliation have been taken.

Reconciliation is an ongoing journey that reminds us that while generations of Australians have fought hard for meaningful change, future gains are likely to take just as much, if not more, effort.

In a just, equitable and reconciled Australia, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children will have the same life chances and choices as non-Indigenous children, and the length and quality of a person's life will not be determined by their racial background.

Our vision of reconciliation is based and measured on five dimensions: historical acceptance; race relations; equality and equity; institutional integrity and unity.

These five dimensions do not exist in isolation, but are interrelated. Reconciliation cannot be seen as a single issue or agenda; the contemporary definition of reconciliation must weave all of these threads together. For example, greater historical acceptance of the wrongs done to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples can lead to improved race relations, which in turn leads to greater equality and equity.
